June Meeting Highlights

Mike called the meeting to order. The minutes from the May meeting were approved as presented.

Ernie gave the treasurer's report. The beginning balance was \$3,822.88. Expenses were \$428.02 to reimburse Bob for cabinet materials. Income included \$12 from the raffle and fifteen cents in interest resulting in an ending balance of \$3,407.01.

Members were reminded about the July pot luck at Carl and Debbie's. A map and more information will be sent later.

Don Barnes announced that his neighbor will be involved in an estate sale in August which will include a wood lathe. More information to follow.

Don Baker reported that he had received three phone calls from members of the public seeking someone to help with a woodturning project. One was time-sensitive and past, one Bob is going to follow up on, and no one knew of anyone who could help with the third project.

He also gave a preview of the August and September demonstrations and if there was any interest in having a handson class the summer. Last summer we had many open spots for the class. No great interest was expressed in a class for this summer.

Don also asked for suggestions for future demonstrations. John and Karel agreed to demonstrate making a Christmas tree ornament from cholla. Thread-chasing was another topic suggested.

Karl Doerry announced that the annual *Its Elemental* exhibit at the Coconino Center for the Arts would be December 3-4. Submissions for the exhibit were encouraged and the club was reminded that this was the big fund-raiser for the year and many volunteers would be needed for the demonstration and sale.

From the Editor

I recently came across a book called The Fundamentals of Woodturning by Mike Darlow. It's a pretty comprehensive overview of woodturning with many photographs and illustrations. Its brief section on *safety* reinforces some of what you've read in the column before but also has some general, basic points which always good to keep in mind.

- 1. Know what actions are likely to be unsafe.
- 2. Develop safe working habits and an awareness of the importance of safety.
- **3.** Tools sometimes fall from your lathe. Wear sturdy shoes.

- **4.** Keep your workshop clean and its floor clear.
- **5.** Ensure that the floor is not slippery.
- **6.** Provide sufficient working area around the machine.
- 7. Stack materials safely.
- 8. Ensure that the wood is free of defects which could cause it to split on the lathe.
- Keep your hands away from the rotating wood unless you have a sound reason to feel or support it.
- 10. Contact with wood sometimes can be a problem. Some species with high levels of extractives can cause dermatitis. Avoid these rather than wear gloves or use barrier creams.
